## Culture, Heritage & Languages, GNWT Comments on Drybones/Wool Bay Environmental Assessments

As per our meeting on Thursday July 17, 2003, the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre (Culture, Heritage & Languages Division of the Government of the Northwest Territories) has the following comments regarding the environmental assessment proceedings of the Drybones/Wool Bay diamond exploration projects:

There has never been a systematic archaeological survey conducted along the north shore of Great Slave Lake, and as a result we lack archaeological baseline data for the Drybones/Wool Bay area. Judging by the extensive record of traditional land use known through Yellowknives Dene First Nation oral histories, it is clear that the area has a long history of human activity. Consequently, it is expected that there would be many archaeological sites in the area.

On the basis of these observations, we strongly recommend that a systematic archaeological survey be completed in the land use area prior to the commencement of mineral exploration activities.
