Dene Languages Conference

Dominion Diamond Corporation was pleased to co-sponsor the Dene Languages Conference in Yellowknife on June 6-7, hosted by the Yellowknives Dene First Nation.

Dominion recognizes the important role that language plays in preserving traditional knowledge and culture, and is pleased to support efforts to strengthen the Dene languages.



Jay Project Update

On May 19, Minister Robert C. McLeod accepted the recommendations of the Mackenzie Valley Environmental Impact Review Board that the Jay Project be approved, subject to the measures described in the Report of Environmental Assessment.

Next Steps

Dominion Diamond is filing water licence and land use permit applications, the next step in the environmental approval of the project.

Jay Feasibility Study

On May 31, Dominion provided an update on the Jay Feasibility Study. Thanks to changes to the Ekati mine plan, which will allow for a continuous supply of ore, the company is able to delay major construction on the Jay project by a year. These changes include availability of Sable ore, deepening of Koala underground, and slower processing to increase diamond recovery. Dominion is completing the Feasibility Study on a revised development schedule.

What does this mean?

The new plan involves the same activities as the previous plan, but on a revised schedule. This schedule includes pre-works activities to assemble a new crusher continuing this summer, construction of the access road from Misery Road to the project site in 2017, and construction of the dike in 2018 to 2020.

Dike instrumentation, dewatering, and the start of mining is planned in 2021, and processing of Jay kimberlite by late 2022.

As part of the development of the Lynx pit at the Ekati mine, Dominion Diamond conducted a fish-out of Lynx Lake last summer, during which 50 pounds of fish were flash-frozen and sent to each IBA community.

Part of the fisheries authorization for the development includes a community-based fish offset project at Jackfish Creek near Łutsel K'e. In early May, information was collected on the fish that use the creek. The approved plan involves making improvements to the creek to allow pike to get from Great Slave Lake to their spawning area.

The Jackfish Creek project is designed to offset the loss of fish and habitat from the development of the Lynx project.

Inuit Tattoo Revitalization - Kugluktuk

Dominion Diamond is proud to be a sponsor of the Inuit Tattoo Revitalization Project. We are excited to give you some insight into the project through the words of the tattoo artist Angela Hovak Johnston herself:

"On April 24 we arrived in Kugluktuk and got set up at the museum. Elder Alice Hikoak Ayalik opened and closed the project with the lighting of the *Qulliq*.

Over the next several days we spent 12-13 hours each day doing tattoos. On April 28, we did a school presentation that was designed to empower high school girls. Then we had a much needed on-theland outing to recharge, before doing more tattoos the next day. A community feast was held at the end of the project.

It was quite an emotional experience. The community was honoured that their community was selected. This has touched not only Inuit women in Kugluktuk, but women all over Nunavut and Canada.

Not only Inuit women – I have women of different ethnic backgrounds come to me and thank us for doing this, saying they are very inspired. This project has given life back to a tradition that was almost lost."
