

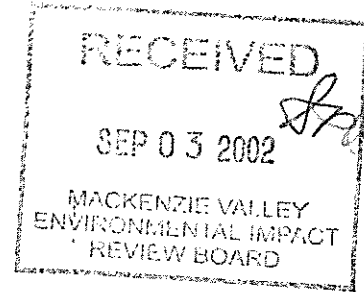

I am forwarding to you 287 letters that were signed by Canadians concerned about the future of Nahanni National Park Reserve and World Heritage Site. As the letters outline, the Nahanni is under threat from mining and oil and gas exploration activities within the watershed, only 1/7th of which is protected as a national park. At the same time, there is an opportunity to achieve greater protection for the region. 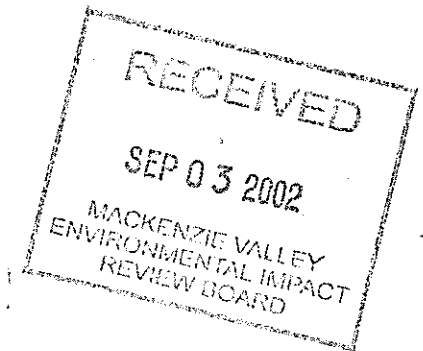

Dear Prime Minister Chrétien:

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Finally, for the mine to operate, a road has been proposed that runs through the sensitive and world renowned Nahanni karst formations – an area that has been identified by Parks Canada as being of High Conservation Value and part of a planned park expansion.

The risk to the ecological integrity of the Nahanni National Park Reserve, a World Heritage Site, from the Prairie Creek mine is too high for the Government of Canada to allow this project to proceed.

Thirty years ago, as Minister responsible for National Parks, you made a visionary decision to protect the Nahanni from hydro development by creating a national park. Once more decisive action is needed to protect this special place. Please ensure that the Prairie Creek mine is stopped, and that the entire Greater Nahanni Ecosystem is protected from ALL industrial development.

I understand that this World Heritage Site is under threat from mining and oil and gas development within the Greater Nahanni Ecosystem. I also understand that real opportunities exist to expand the protection of this area so that future generations can experience the beauty of this wilderness area.

The Mackenzie Valley Environmental Impact Review Board has recently issued a report which finds that the proposed developments at the Prairie Creek Mine upstream from Nahanni National Park will cause significant impacts to water quality. In addition, I understand there are large quantities of cyanide, PCBs and diesel fuel that have been stored at the mine site for 20 years, on the banks of Prairie Creek. The mine site is located in a region that is prone to both flash flooding and earthquake activity. Either of these events could result in contamination of the pristine waters of Prairie Creek, regardless of any precautionary measures taken.

Also, I understand that the ores that Canadian Zinc proposes to extract are heavily contaminated with mercury as well as arsenic and antimony, leading to further risk of water contamination from run-off should the mine be allowed to go ahead.

Finally, for the mine to operate, a road has been proposed that runs through the sensitive and world renowned Nahanni karst formations – an area that has been identified by Parks Canada as being of High Conservation Value and part of a planned park expansion.

As a Canadian who cares deeply about Canada's wild rivers and wilderness areas, I am writing to express my concern about the future of Nahanni National Park Reserve. I understand that this World Heritage Site is under threat from mining and oil and gas development within the Greater Nahanni Ecosystem. I also understand that real opportunities exist to expand the protection of this area so that future generations can experience the beauty of this wilderness area.

I am particularly concerned about the Prairie Creek mine site upstream from the South Nahanni River. I understand there are large quantities of cyanide, PCBs and diesel fuel that have been stored at the mine site for 20 years, on the banks of Prairie Creek. This poses an unacceptable risk of contamination to the creek and national park waters downstream. Also, I understand that the ores that Canadian Zinc proposes to extract are heavily contaminated with mercury as well as arsenic and antimony, leading to further risk of water contamination should the mine be allowed to go ahead.

The risk to the ecological integrity of the Nahanni National Park Reserve, a World Heritage Site, from the Prairie Creek mine is too high for the Government of Canada to allow this project to proceed. Please ensure that the mine is stopped, and that the entire Greater Nahanni Ecosystem is protected from ALL industrial development.

I understand that this World Heritage Site is under threat from mining development within the South Nahanni watershed. I also understand that real opportunities exist to expand the protection of this area so that future generations of Canadians can experience the grandeur of this northern river in its pristine state.

The Mackenzie Valley Environmental Impact Review Board has recently issued a report which finds that the proposed developments at the Prairie Creek Mine upstream from Nahanni National Park will cause significant impacts to water quality. In addition, I understand that there are large quantities of both cyanide and diesel fuel stored at the mine site. The mine site is located in a region that is prone to both flash flooding and earthquake activity. Either of these events could result in contamination of the pristine waters of Prairie Creek, regardless of any precautionary measures taken.


Also, I understand that the ores that Canadian Zinc proposes to extract are heavily contaminated with mercury as well as arsenic and antimony, leading to further risk of water contamination from run-off should the mine be allowed to go ahead.

Finally, for the mine to operate, a road has been proposed that runs through the sensitive and world renowned Nahanni karst formations – an area that has been identified by Parks Canada as being of High Conservation Value and part of a planned park expansion.

The risk to the ecological integrity of the Nahanni region from the Prairie Creek mine is too high for the Government of Canada to allow this project to proceed. Given Canada's international obligations to protect Nahanni as a World Heritage Site, this mine must be stopped. I ask that you do everything in your power to ensure that this happens.

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

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
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
