


Spill Contingency Plan


In the event of a spill of any type of fuel, oil product or any other hazardous material these procedures will be followed, subject to the safety of all personal involved in the operation:


- 1. Determine the source and if possible prevent any further spillage from occuring, such as closing valves, shutting down equipment, plugging source of leak.
- 2. Identify any possible sources of ignition and remove or disable them.
- 3. Contain the spill and if able begin clean up to minimize any further hazard and or damage.
- 4. Report the spill to the 24 Hour Spill Report Line 867-920-8130.
- 5. Determine if additional materials, equipment and manpower are required to deal with the situation and arrange for same.
- 6. Complete clean up and remove contaminated materials to proper disposal facility.
- 7. Should contaminated materials have to be dealt with on site this will only be done with the knowledge, approval and if necessary the direction of the proper government authorities.
- 8. A written report will be filed with the necessary departments.

For the purposes of the planned exploration program the largest volume of fuel in a single container will be 205 liters Drill additives which may be of a hazardous nature will be in 20 liter pails.

Material Safety Data Sheets are on file and will be kept on hand at the campsite.

I write to you with our concerns for development that is occurring in Akaitcho Territory without consultation with or the consent of the Deninu K'ue First Nation regarding treaty rights.

Mining exploration development is underway in the vicinity of Drybones Bay, on Great Slave Lake, in the middle of Akaitcho Territory, in an area that we of the Deninu K'ue First Nation have used to exercise our treaty rights to hunt, fish, trap and gather for generations. A permit has recently been issued by the Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board in relation to this development. There are a number of other applications for permits for mining exploration purposes in the same area currently before the Board. There has been no consultation by representatives of your department with the Deninn K'ne First Nation regarding impacts and infringements of the development or proposed developments on the treaty rights of members of our First Nation.

Furthermore, the Akaitche Territory Dene First Nations, of which we are a member, have been engaged in the process of preparing schedules to the Interim Measures Agreement under the Akaitche Territory Dene First Nations Framework Agreement to allow for the pre-screening of applications regarding land and water use in Akaitcho Territory. Officials of your department are actively involved in the preparation of these schedules. The Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board is well aware of this process and the importance of this process to the Akaitcho First Nations.

However, both your department and the Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board are ignoring this process and are authorizing and allowing development to proceed in Akaitcho Territory without consultation regarding treaty rights, and without our consent.

The Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board (Board) recently denied Land Use Permit MV2002C0083 to Mr. David Smith for Mineral Exploration at Dry Bones Bay for further study. The Board will soon render its decisions on the following Drybunes Bay area Land Use Permit Applications.

- 1. MV2003C0008. North American General Resources, Mineral Exploration, Dry Bones Bay.
- 2. MV2003C0003. Consolidated Goldwin Ventures Inc., Mineral Exploration, Dry Bones Bay.
- 3. MV2003C0016. New Shoshoni Ventures Ltd., Mineral Exploration, Dry Bones Bay.

On a matter of jurisdiction, the YKDFN notes that two of the proposed drilling programs would take place on the frozen surface of Great Slave Lake. The YKDFN questions whether such water based drilling programs are regulated within the scope and jurisdiction of the Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board.

The YKDFN is requesting the denial of all cited Land Use Permits for further study in order to address significant YKDFN membership concerns and to obtain additional

information for the Board before it renders its decisions.1

The YKDFN recently concluded a two day public meeting on the Drybones Bay and Wool Bay areas. The YKDFN is preparing transcripts of the April 2, 2003 public session and will put them on your public record. A video record is also available at your convenience.

As you may know from our previous correspondence. Yellowknives Dene Research (community surveys available at the Land and Environment office) concludes that that the following individuals, families and extended families use and occupy the Drybones Bay and or Wool Bay areas. It is also highly likely that others from the community of Lutsel K'e use the areas as well.

The YKDFN have also identified the following significant valued attributes of the Wool Bay and Drybones Bay areas:

1. Culturally vital (many residents grew up and spent summers in the areas, and continue to actively use the areas).

2. Spiritually significant (site identified by YKDFN)

3. Numerous grave sites at the bays and along the shoreline

(2) Subject to subsection (3), where the Board does not return an application under paragraph

(1)(a), it shall, within 42 days after receipt of the application,

(a) issue a Type A permit, subject to any conditions included pursuant to subsection 26(1);

(b) order, pursuant to subsection 24(1) of the Act, that a hearing be held or further studies or investigations be made respecting the lands proposed to be used in the land-use operation and notify the applicant in writing of the reasons therefore;

(c) refer the application to the Mackenzie Valley Environmental Impact Review Board for an environmental assessment pursuant to subsection 125(1) of the Act and notify the applicant in writing of the reasons therefore; or

(d) where a requirement set out in section 61 or 62 of the Act has not been met, refuse to issue a permit and notify the applicant in writing of its refusal and of the reasons therefore.

(3) Where the Board makes an order under paragraph (2)(b) or a reference under paragraph (2)(c), the time provided in subsection (2) for the Board to issue a permit or to refuse to issue a permit does not begin until (a) in respect of an order under paragraph (2)(b), the completion of the hearing, further studies or investigation; and

(b) in respect of a reference under paragraph (2)(c), the completion of the environmental impact assessment and review process under Part V of the Act.

In addition, the YKDFN public meeting confirmed the following valued ecosystem components (VEC) that might be impacted significantly by the proposed developments, either individually or collectively:

- 1. Raptors,
- 2. moose,
- 3. muskrat.
- 4. fish,
- 5. beaver,
- 6. water.
- 7. wildlife habitat,
- 8. Grasslands.

The membership also noted that moose are already being impacted because of the low flying planes and helicopters.

In addition to concerns about impacts on the valued ecosystem components, the YKDFN membership would like additional study completed on the following:

Effective use of forest resources

Members cited that there were impacts to forest resources with all the trees getting knocked down for trails, drilling and ground magnetic surveys.

Sound effects on wildlife

There were questions about how sound impacted wildlife, and how a relatively pristine area could be changed by the year round sound. ...4 4

Impact on inland streams Members wondered how the current work programs would impact the main streams flowing into Drybones Bay and what would happen to the lake and the surrounding wetlands if the major arteries into Great Slave Lake from Drybones Bay were impacted.

Membership expressed serious concern about the cumulative impacts from the exploration activities. "If five companies get permission, then other companies see the door open and move forward with their applications and this will result in cumulative impacts."

Cumulative Impacts of Improved Access

Improved winter road access to the areas will open up new lands, and this is an added impact. Then there are associated impacts. Outfitters will add small camps because there is a winter road. "The open door effect" that will result in increased traffic that results in increased garbage, noise and general nuisances. Impacts that were not there before the ice winter road. If the road cannot be controlled there will be an impact including additional cabin construction. Cabin construction that is unmanaged and uncontrolled. The Snowmobile association is marking trails and opening the land up to more and more people and this is also causing an impact. Trails are being overtaken by other users.

The Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board denied a Land Use Permit at the Drybones Bay area for further study. There are three additional Land Use Permits for the Dry Bones Bay area. The YKDFN is requesting that the denial of the Land Use Permit applications for further study. The study would be used to ascertain the extent and specific nature of public concern consolidate existing YKDFN documentation of the area, synthesize known information on the identified VECs, and to assemble alternative cumulative impact mitigation strategies.

The YKDFN are making every effort to participate in the Boards processes in a fair and productive manner. We hope that by proposing a constructive and proactive approach to addressing issues we can collectively ensure the well-being of all northerners. Once again we write to you with our concerns for development that is occurring in Akaitcho Territory without consultation with or the consent of the Akaitcho Territory Dene First Nations regarding treaty rights.

We understand that mining exploration development is underway in the vicinity of Drybones Bay, on Great Slave Lake, in the middle of Akaitcho Territory and that a permit has recently been issued by the Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board in relation to this development. While there have been some discussions by the Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board, with representatives of our First Nations regarding environmental concerns there has been no consultation by representatives of your department regarding impacts and infringements of the development on the treaty rights of members of the Akaitcho Territory Dene First Nations.

Furthermore, we are and have been engaged in the process of preparing schedules to the Interim Measures Agreement under the Akaitcho Territory Dene First Nations Framework Agreement to allow for the pre-screening of applications regarding land and water use in Akaitcho Territory. Officials of your department are actively involved in the preparation of these schedules. The Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board is well aware of this process and the importance if this process to the Akaitcho First Nations.

However, both your department and the Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board are ignoring this process and are authorizing and allowing development to proceed in Akaitcho Territory without consultation regarding really rights, and without our consent.
