I understood that the whole Nahanni Watershed was to be protected. Without total and ironclad protection, the Nahanni National Park and other sites downstream could be jeopardized.

Please ensure that no mining activity will be undertaken without proper environmental assessments -- including the whole Prairie Creek mine operation, and the access road.
